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Foreword

We would like to present to you the methodological study "Family support and foster care system" developed by the Centre of Social Assistance Statistics in the Statistical Office in Kraków. The goal of the study is to present the methodology of research on institutional and family foster care and day-support centres providing care and education to children as well as the youths who are entirely or partially deprived of care and support from their natural families.

The survey "Family support and foster care system" is a continuous, annual and complex survey, in theme 1.20. "Family" included in the national statistical survey programme of Poland. Information on the infrastructure and activities of institutional foster care and day-support centres is collected with the use of reporting form PS- 01, while the survey on family foster care with the use of PS-02 reporting form. The study also includes an aggregated dataset from the factual and financial report of the Ministry of Family and Social Policy on the execution of tasks in the field of family support and foster care concerning forms of family support and aggregated dataset resulting from the report of the Ministry of Justice on family issues of minors concerning the number of domestic and foreign adoptions by age of adopted child.

The methodological study describes the subjective and objective scope of the survey, presents the methodology and organisation of the survey and definitions of underlying concepts, describes the tools for the survey and the forms of data dissemination. The methodological study is supplemented with the applicable model reporting forms with explanatory notes and a list of variables in the survey. The information on changes in relation to the previous edition of the methodological report is included in Annex 3.

The methodological study is addressed to the institutions transmitting data on institutional foster care, family foster care and day-support centres, as well as to persons using research results disseminated by public statistics in this area.

We hope you will like such a way of presenting the methodology of the survey. We would be grateful for your comments and suggestions for changes, which will help improve the survey in consecutive years and adapt it to the needs of its users.

Introduction

The goal of the survey 1.20.04 "Family support and foster care system" is to provide information on the situation of children deprived of parental care, on the activity of institutional and family foster care institutions and day-support centres, and on the state of infrastructure in those institutions. The collected data are used to produce the annual information on the implementation of the Act on Support for the Family and Foster Care System, which is submitted by 31 July to the Polish Parliament by the Council of Ministers.

The study consists of seven parts. The first part describes the subjective and objective scope of the study. In the second part the types and methods of the study are discussed, while the third part characterises the data collection tools. The fourth part is devoted to the variables occurring in the survey, the resultant information presented and the explanation of basic concepts in the field of family support and foster care. The consecutive two parts refer to the description of the organisation of the survey and to the presentation of developed results. The last seventh part is devoted to the assessment of the quality of the survey.

The legal basis for the study "Supporting family and foster care system" are:

1. Subjective and objective scope of the research

1.1. Subjective scope of the research

The subjective scope of the research encompasses:

- institutional foster care facilities: socialisation care centres, intervention care centres, specialised therapy centres, family care centres, facilities combining the tasks of socialisation, intervention and specialised therapy centres; regional care and therapy centres; pre-adoptive intervention centres,
- day-support centres: general care, specialised, street work, task combining centre,
- foster families: related, not professional, professional, professional specialised, professional performing the function of a family emergency house, family foster homes,
- · assisting families,
- supporting families,
- families assisted by supporting families,
- families receiving specialised counselling,
- family foster care coordinators,
- family assistants,
- national and foreign adoptions.

1.2. Objective scope of the research

The research provides information on:

- · types of institutional foster care and day-support centres,
- the number of places in institutional foster care and day-support centres,
- number of children in foster care by selected demographic and social characteristics,
- · number of volunteers.
- number and type of adaptation to the needs of persons with disabilities,
- essential qualities of a person acting as a foster family or running a family home,
- · reasons for leaving foster care,
- number of assisting families,
- · number of supporting families,
- number of family assistants,
- number of family foster care coordinators,
- number of families benefiting from supporting families or from specialised advisory in family support,
- number and type of adoptions,
- number of adoptions by age of adopted children.

2. Type of the survey and applied method

2.1. Description of the method of the survey

The survey, which uses the forms "Report on institutional foster care and day-support centres" with the symbol PS-01 and "Report on family foster care" with the symbol PS-02, is a comprehensive research. In compliance with the provisions of the national statistical survey programme of Poland, entities conducting the survey submit data in electronic form once a year for the previous year. A detailed timetable for the organisation of the survey in a given year, including data collection and processing, development of control and result tables and the release of result is contained in the schedule of the survey.

The methodology of the research carried out and the survey tools are updated on an ongoing basis in accordance with current legal acts regulating family support and the foster care system.

The most important modifications introduced to the survey by Statistics Poland in recent years are outlined below.

In institutional foster care and day-support centres

Since 2012, the data on institutional foster care and day-support institutions have been collected in the form PS-01 "Report on institutional foster care and day-support care". Until 2000, the form S-13 "Report on foster home, family foster home, family emergency house, foster family and children's village" was obligatory. In 2001, the form was renamed to PS-01 "Report on day-support centre and foster families". From 2003 onwards, information on foster families was removed from the PS-01 form, and the name of the form "Report on foster centre" remained in force until 2011.

The Act of 9 June 2011 on family support and foster care system resulted in the exclusion of foster care from social assistance system. The Act adopted the division of forms of foster care into family foster care and institutional foster care. Since 2012, the PS-01 form has been renamed "Report on institutional foster care and day-support centres".

In 2017, the form was extended by information on the adaptation of institutions to the needs of persons with disabilities (questions were added about: lifts adapted for wheelchair users, rooms/bathrooms adapted for persons with disabilities, adaptation for the hearing impaired and deaf people, non-slip floors).

In 2019 in the part of the form dedicated to the care and educational centres, regional care and therapeutic centres and pre-adoptive intervention centres the questions on foreigners at age from 0 to 17 were added and in 2022 – the questions on the residents with regulated legal status, including the ones transferred to the adoption centre. Also in 2022 in the part of the form dedicated to the information on day-support centre the questions on foreigners who used them, including adolescent citizens of Ukraine as of 31 December and throughout the reference year, were added.

In family foster care

Until 2000 information on foster families was collected on form S-13 "Report on a foster homes, family foster homes, family emergency house, foster family and children's village" and in the period 2001-2002 on form PS-01 "Report of foster care and foster families". Following the removal of information on foster families from the PS-01 form in 2003, the PS-02 form "Report on foster families" was introduced and remained in force from 2003 to 2011. Since 2012, data on family foster care have been collected on form PS-02 "Report on family foster care". Until 2018 there was a separate form for each type of foster family and foster homes. In 2019 the form was modified in order to enable transmitting data on all types of family foster care in one questionnaire form. In the same year in the part of the form dedicated to children in family foster care the extra questions on foreigners at age from 0 to 17 were added and in 2022 – on children with regulated legal status, including the ones assigned to adoption centre.

2.2. Data sources for mapping and their types

The selection range for the PS-01 form is developed with the use of the Database of Statistical Units (BJS). BJS fulfils the function of a statistical register for all units recorded in the National Official Business Register and those for which the REGON number is not required but which are subjects to statistical surveys, e.g. day-support centres, which do not need to have a separate REGON number. For such units, in order to obtain information on their actual territorial distribution, the Statistical Office in Krakow gives the conventional REGON numbers.

In terms of selection of units adopted for the survey, the update of the BJS list is made on the basis of the lists of general care and day-support centres submitted by voivodship, powiat and gmina offices to the Statistical Office in Kraków.

The catalogue is generated with the use of the algorithm for legal, local and conventional units, according to the annual state of BJS and by the following characteristics:

- Polish Classification of Activities (PKD 2007):
 - 8790, 8790Z Other social assistance with accommodation,
 - 8899, 8899Z Other social work activities without accommodation, not elsewhere classified.
- The legal and economic activity of entities (APE) is described by the symbol:
 - APE 11 Active entity operating.
- Type of units covered (RJ):
 - PSPO Day-support centre run as general care centre,
 - PSFPO Branch of day-support centre run as general care centre,
 - PSPS Day-support centre run as specialised centre,
 - PSFPS Branch of day-support centre run in the form of general care centre,

- PSPP Day-support centre run in the form of street work,
- PSPF Day-support centre run in combination of the forms,
- PSPSOC Socialisation care centre,
- PSPI Intervention care centre.
- PSFPI Branch of intervention care centre,
- PSPST Specialised therapy care centre,
- PSPR Family care centre,
- PSFPR Branch of family care centre.
- PSPW General care and educational centre combining the tasks of socialisation, intervention, specialised and therapy centres.
- PSRPOT Regional care and therapy centre,
- PSIOP Pre-adoptive intervention centre.

The survey frame for the PS-02 form is developed with the use of the statistical units database.

The catalogue is generated with the use of the algorithm for conventional units, according to the annual state of BJS and by the following characteristics:

- Legal and economic activity of entities (APE) described by symbol:
 - APE 11 Active entity operating.
- Type of units covered (RJ):
 - PSRZS Related foster family.

In next survey the type of unit above shall be replaced by common, for all entities encompassed by the survey, type of unit PSRPZ – Family foster care.

3. Tools for data collection

The tool used to carry out the survey on foster care is the reporting forms PS-01 and PS-02, included in Appendix 1 to this study. These are questionnaires consisting of an identification part and closed questions organised in several thematic sections. *Explanatory Notes containing basic definitions* are an integral part of the forms. The reporting forms are described below:

PS-01 "Report on institutional foster care and day-support centres"

Section 1 *General data* – contains information about the type of facility, the managing organisation and address data (voivodeship, powiat, city with powiat status). It also contains information on the organisation's adaptation to the needs of persons with disabilities.

In Section 2 Selected information on a care and educational institution of the socialisation type (symbol 5), the intervention type (symbol 6), the specialist therapy type (symbol 7), the family type (symbol 8), an institution combining the tasks of institutions (symbol 9), a regional care and therapy institution (symbol 10), a pre-adoptive intervention centre (symbol 11) – there is information on the number of places, the number of children in an institution on the day of the survey (31 December), by age groups, demographic and social features, and on the number of children who left foster care during the year, by the reason for leaving.

Section 3: Selected information on day-support institutions run as: day-support centre (symbol 1), specialised centre (symbol 2), street work (symbol 3), task combining centres (symbol 4) – contains information on the number of days the institution was open, the number of working hours per week, the number of places, the number of users as of 31 December and throughout the reference year including foreigners and adolescent citizens of Ukraine, the number of disabled as of 31 December and the number of volunteers throughout the reference year.

PS-02 "Report on family foster care"

Section 1 *General data* – contains information on the form of family foster care and on the reporting unit filling in the report (organiser of family foster care).

In Section 2 Family foster care – as of 31 December – there is information on the number of foster families and foster homes by the number of children admitted and by demographic and social characteristics of the persons fulfilling the function of family foster care.

Section 3 *Children in family foster care – as of 31 December –* contains information on the number of children in a given form of family foster care by age groups, demographic and social characteristics, the number of children under 18 and adults who left family foster care in the reference year by reasons for leaving family foster care.

Administrative data

The aggregated dataset extracted from the material and financial reports dealing with tasks in the field of family support and foster care system collected every year by Statistics Poland from the Ministry of Family, Labour and Social Policy.

The aggregated dataset extracted from the Juvenile Family Cases Report on the number of domestic and foreign adoptions by age of the adopted children collected every year by Statistics Poland from the Ministry of Justice.

4. Variables in the survey

4.1. Main survey variables

The variables of the study were broken down by the type.

Institutional foster care and day-support centres

Qualitative variables

- institutional foster care centre.
- supervisory body in charge of placement in institutional foster care,
- adaptation in institutional foster care (type of adaptation entry ramp to facilitate entry into the building, automatically open door, lifts, including lifts adapted for wheelchair users, rooms/rooms with bathrooms adapted for disabled persons, bathrooms adapted for disabled persons, adaptation for the sight impaired and blind people, adaptation for hearing impaired and deaf people, non-slip floors, other adaptation for disabled persons),
- day-support centre,
- · supervisory body of the day-support centre,
- adaptation in day-support centre (type of adaptation entry ramp to facilitate entry into the building, automatically open door, lifts, including lifts adapted for wheelchair users, rooms/rooms with bathrooms adapted for disabled persons, bathrooms adapted for disabled persons, adaptation for the sight impaired and blind people, adaptation for hearing impaired and deaf people, non-slip floors, other adaptation for disabled persons).

The detailed list of variables for the forms PS-01 "Report on institutional foster care and day-support centres" and PS-02 "Report on family foster care", including: field code, description of the field, position in the form, is presented in Appendix 2.

Forms of family support

Quantitative variables

- family assistant,
- family assisted by a family assistant,
- · supporting family,
- family benefiting from the supporting family,
- family receiving specialised counselling,
- family foster care coordinator.

Adoptions

Quantitative variables

- adoption by age of adoptees (number of persons),
- number of cases in which adoption was adjudicated for persons living abroad,
- number of cases in which natural parents' consent to adoption without indicating the adopter.

4.2. Indicators and methods of their calculation

The resulting information is presented in the form of indicators in addition to data in absolute numbers:

4.3. Key concepts and definitions

The definitions presented have been categorised according to the subject scope of the study. The definitions were taken from the Act of 9 June 2011 concerning Family Support and Foster Care System (uniform text, Journal of Laws 2024 item 177, with later amendments) and the Act of 25 February 1964 – The Family and Guardianship Code (uniform text, Journal of Laws 2023 item 2809, with later amendments).

Institutional foster care – is provided in the forms of:

- foster care centre,
- · regional foster care centre and therapy centre,
- pre-adoptive intervention centre.

Care and educational centre – provides a child deprived entirely or partially of parental care with round-the-clock, continuous or periodical care and education and meets its primary needs, in particular: emotional, developmental, health, living, social, religious and assure the use of health and educational benefits on the basis of separate provisions.

The following types of facilities can be distinguished:

socialisation centre – provides round-the-clock care and education for the child and meets the child's
primary needs, in particular emotional, developmental, health, living, social and religious; implements a
plan of assistance for the child developed in cooperation with a family assistant; facilitates the contact
with parents and other relatives; takes measures in order to return child to the family; provides the access
to education appropriate to the child's age and developmental capabilities; assures the therapy activities;
ensures the use of entitled health benefits,

- **intervention centre** provides emergency care for child in a crisis; in particular, the centre is obliged to host the child in cases requiring immediate care,
- **family centre** brings up children at different ages, including those growing up and becoming self-dependenced; assures common upbringing and care for many children; no more than 8 children can stay in the centre at the same time.
- specialist therapy centre takes care of a child with individual needs, in particular: certified with disability
 or moderate or severe degree of disability, requiring special educational methods and specialised
 therapy; requiring compensating developmental and educational retarding; the centre provides classes:
 educational, socio-therapy, corrective, compensatory, speech therapy, therapy, compensating for
 shortages in education in the family and prepares for socialisation. For children with disabilities it
 provides appropriate rehabilitation and revalidation classes,
- **units combining the tasks of foster care centre** it provides care and education by performing the tasks provided for an institution of the following types: socialisation, intervention and specialist therapy.

Regional foster care and therapy centre – hosts children who, due to their health, require the specialist treatment and rehabilitation and cannot be placed in family foster care or in a foster care centre. No more than 30 children can be placed there at the same time.

Pre-adoptive intervention centre – hosts children up to one year of age who require specialised care and cannot be placed in family foster care while waiting for adoption. No more than 20 children can be placed in the centre at the same time.

Day-support centre – supports care and educational functions of the family. It can operate in the form of:

- **general care** provides the child with care and education, assistance in learning, organisation of leisure time, play and sports activities and hobbies development, in the form of interest groups, day-support centres, clubs and educational centres,
- specialised organises socio-therapy, therapy, corrective, compensatory and speech therapy classes; implements an individual corrective programme, psychological preventive or corrective programme, in particular pedagogical, psychological and socio-therapy ones,
- street work deals with animation and socio-therapy activities,
- task combining centre the unit combining the tasks of foster care centre, specialised centre and street work.

Family foster care – is exercised when parents are unable to provide care and education for a child. It consists in work with a family, aimed to facilitate the child the return to their family. When this is not possible, it makes efforts in order to prepare the child to be adopted or prepared for self-dependenced and responsible life, by meeting its living, health, emotional, educational, cultural, recreational and religious needs.

The forms of family foster care are:

- foster family,
- foster home.

Foster family – provides care and education for children who are entirely or partially deprived of parental care. The following types of foster families are distinguished:

- **related foster family** formed by ascendants or siblings; it is entitled to receive financial assistance for the child's living expenses,
- not professional foster family formed by persons who are not ascendants or siblings; it is entitled to a
 cash benefit to cover the living expenses of each child placed in it; no more than 3 children (except for
 many children) are placed in not professional family at the same time,
- **professional foster family** formed by persons who are not ascendants or siblings; in addition to a financial allowance to cover the costs of living for each child, it also receives remuneration for acting as foster family; no more than 3 children (except for many siblings) are placed in the family at the same time; professional foster family operates as:

- professional foster family performing the function of family emergency house hosts child on the
 basis of a court verdict, in cases where child has been intercepted by the police or border guard, at
 the request of the child's parents or other person, in the event of a direct threat to child's life or health
 related to domestic violence,
- specialised professional foster family in particular it hosts: children with a disability certificate or certificate with a severe or moderate degree of disability, children under the Act of 9 June 2022 on supporting juvenile resocialisation (Journal of Laws 2022, item 1700, as amended), adolescent mothers with children.

Foster home – is formed by nuclear family or single person. It can host no more than 8 children at one time (except for many siblings).

Family foster care coordinator – person appointed by the foster care organiser responsible for foster families and foster homes.

Organiser of family foster care – an organisational unit appointed by the president of powiat or an entity (non-governmental organisations, legal persons, the Catholic Church and other churches and religious associations operating in the field of family support, foster care or social assistance) to which the powiat contracted the implementation of the task.

Family assistant – person working with a family experiencing difficulties in fulfilling its caring and education functions.

Assisting family – a family that temporarily cares for a child when foster family or foster home cannot perform their tasks, due to holidays, participation in training, hospitalisation, unforeseen difficulties or random events in foster family or foster home.

Supporting family – a family that helps a child's natural family experiencing difficulties in fulfilling its caring and education functions. With the cooperation of the family assistant, it helps in:

- care and education of the child.
- household keeping,
- the creation and fulfilment of primary social roles.

Adoption – legal family foster care relationship between adopter and adopted, similar to relations between parents and child.

Types of adoption:

- Full adoption prevails in Polish legislation. The adopted person becomes a member of the adopter's
 family and the effects of the adoption are extended to the adopter's entire family as if adopted person
 had been born as the adopter's natural child. Mutual rights and alimony obligations arise, when rights
 and obligations regarding the child's natural family expire. Full adoption usually brings about a change of
 the child's last name and testified in new birth certificate. It is terminable,
- Partial adoption results in a family relationship only between the adoptee and the adopter. It does not
 extend to the adopter's relatives. The birth certificate is unchanged except for the information on the
 adoption,
- Form adoption also known as anonymous adoption, is the most far-reaching type of adoption. It is only
 possible if the child's parents, facing guardianship court, express consent to adoption without indication

5. Organisation and managing the conduct of the survey

The survey on family support and the foster care system is conducted on the basis of the public statistics Act of 29 June 1995 and the Prime Minister's Regulation on the national statistical survey programme of Poland for a reference year. The author's unit is GUS, Department of Social Research and Labour Market. The unit responsible for conveying the survey in the scope of reporting PS-01 "Report on institutional foster care and day-support centres" and PS- 02 "Report on family foster care" is the Statistical Office in Kraków. The survey is developed in cooperation with the GUS Department of Programming, Research Coordination and Registers and the Centre for Statistical Information.

The Statistical Office in Kraków develops graphic templates for PS-01 and PS-02 reporting forms, the rules of registration, formal, logical and accounting validation of electronic forms, rules of the Survey Information System, and test the electronic forms. In addition, the Statistical Office in Kraków is involved in the development of mock-up control and outcome tables. In the course of the survey, the officers monitor the units which do not report, explain inconsistencies with the reporting entities, check and correct the data and analyse the completeness and quality of the data. When the data collection is over, they complete the control and outcome tables as well as the tables for Local Data Bank in accordance with previously developed mock-ups, prepare data to feel the knowledge databases, develop nationwide completeness reports and reports on the course of the survey. The detailed timetable for the organisation of the survey in a given year is included in the survey schedules, which cover the individual stages of the survey: preparation, data collection and processing, development of control and outcome tables, dissemination of results, developing datasets.

Data are collected annually and cover the period from 1 January to 31 December of the year surveyed or as of 31 December (according to the guidelines for individual variables). The mandatory form of the survey is electronic. For the units with no more than 5 employees, it is possible to submit data in paper form.

Surveyed units receive a note on reporting obligation. Reminders are sent to reporters who have not produced their reports on time to remind them of their obligation to complete the survey. Data from reports that arrive in paper form are recorded in the Reporting Portal and, once the survey is completed in the Reporting Portal, in the Survey Information System.

The process of validation of the data takes place in the Reporting Portal at the stage of filling in the PS-01 form (ongoing logical and accounting validation), as well as in the Survey Information System (analysis of data consistency on the form, comparison with data from the previous reporting period). In the final stage of the survey, a set of control and outcome tables is developed using Microsoft Reporting Services tools. Once the survey is completed and the national dataset is validated, the data are disseminated among statistical offices and external users.

6. Method of presenting the survey results

7. Evaluation of the quality of the survey

The surveys done with the use of report forms PS-01 and PS-02 are complex with no missing responses. The surveys are conducted in accordance with assumed time schedule. The completeness of the PS-01 report has remained at 100% for several years. About 10% of surveyed units is in suspension or is closed in a given year, undeleted in the range selection, despite annual updating of the catalogue (via contact with local government offices, gmina offices and powiat offices). The time period between the completion of the survey and the date of its dissemination is 72 days. The data availability index is 100%.

The completeness of the PS-02 report is 100%. The time period between the completion of the survey and the date of final results dissemination is 70 working days. The data availability index is 100%.

- care and education;
- 2) learning support;
- organisation of leisure time, fun and sporting activities and development of hobbies.

Carries out ongoing work with the child's family.

In addition to above-mentioned, the specialised centre runs:

- socio-therapy activities,
- therapy, compensatory and speech therapy activities
- · individualised correction programmes,
- provides assistance in school, family, peer and in personal crises.

The stay in the above-mentioned centres is voluntary and free of charge, parents or carers should actively participate in the educational activities organised in the centres. - family (symbol 8) refers to sections 1 and 2 (box 4). It extends family, raises children of different ages, including the growing up and becoming self-dependenced, and enables many children to be raised and cared for together. Cooperates with the family foster care coordinator and the family assistant. No more than 8 children and persons who have reached the age of majority can stay in a family-type institution at the same time.
- combining the tasks of the centres (symbol 9) refers to sections 1 and 2 (section 1, 2, 3 depending on the forms chosen).

The regional care and therapy centre (symbol 10) refers to sections 1 and 2 (box 5).

Children in need of special care are placed who, according to to their of health requiring the use of specialised care and rehabilitation, they cannot be placed in family foster care or in institutional foster care. No more than 30 children in total can be placed in a regional foster care centre at the same time.

Pre-adoptive intervention centre (symbol 11) refers to sections 1 and 2 (box 6).

Children admitted there require specialised care and cannot be placed in family foster care while waiting for adoption. No more than 20 children can be placed in an pre-adoptive intervention centre at the same time. Child's stay in the centre cannot be longer until the moment the child is one year old
